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2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The mentoring of students is an integral part of the curriculum. Our institution, SES College Sreekandapuram also has an effective mentoring system. For its effective and productive implementation, efforts are taken right from the beginning of the academic year to identify the slow learners and tutorial system and remedial teaching is followed in the college. Special efforts are taken to identify advanced learners and opportunities for their growth are facilitated. There is a mentoring and tutorial system in practice through which every batch of students has a Mentor or tutor, who is responsible in looking after the welfare of that batch. The tutors maintain close watch over the progress of the wards, their academic, general behaviour and emotional well being by meeting them on regular intervals. Tutors also met the parents of these wards at least once in every semester. Mentoring or tutorial systems enhance the students' confidence and capacity for setting higher goals, taking risks and ultimately guiding them to achieve higher levels. There are various programmes initiated by the Government of Kerala and Higher Education Department for the empowerment of students also implemented in our institution which includes WWS, SSP and ASAP. 1) Walk with Scholar (WWS) initiative by the Government of Kerala has been adopted and done in a worthwhile manner. For this programme 30 students from each batch are selected and allotted (5 each) to 6 internal mentors. Mentors of the college are accessible, responsive, open minded, student oriented and dedicated to the development of his/ her mentees. As a part of this programme, external mentoring sessions are also conducted. 2) Scholar Support Programme(SSP) is another initiative of the Government of Kerala conducted for developing slow learners. Here also teachers are set as mentors and take additional classes for the identified slow learners. 3) Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP) is an initiative by Higher and General Education Departments of Kerala to address the issues of growing unemployment in the state. The programme aims at equipping selected students with skills in communication, IT, and selected areas of industry and service sectors. S.E.S College conducts ASAP classes in a very systematic and structured way. SES ASAP conducted surveys and awareness on socially relevant areas and conducted multiple programmes within and outside the campus.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The institution adopts a well planned Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) System to assess all aspects of a student's development on a continuous basis throughout the year. An orientation programme is arranged for the first year students to familiarise them with the changing environment from the higher secondary level to the college level. Being an affiliated college, all the major evaluation reforms of the university are adopted by the institution. The university has introduced the internal mark system. The university has also introduced a choice based credit system. To cope with the university reforms the college has intimated the faculty members as to how the marks for the internal assessment have to be awarded to the students. The faculty members also have taken the responsibility of guiding the students for the extra cocurricular activities for which a credit has to be earned by the students in each of the semesters. The following measures have been taken for the continuous evaluation. Students progress is evaluated through assignments, seminars, viva voce model examinations, lab involvement, completion of practical and submission of records. Class tests are conducted regularly by the teachers as a teaching learning activity. Two internal examinations are conducted during each semester apart from the model examination. Students who miss these examinations with valid reasons are given another opportunity to appear for the test. Attendance is marked in each hour and the corresponding marks for attendance are reckoned in the calculation of internal marks.,

Continuous assessment marks , final examination marks, attendance details, achievements and academic programme drawbacks of the students are discussed with parents. The institution is keen on monitoring the performance of the students and report to the Parents. Progress Reports are given to the parents after each of the semester by conducting Parents Teachers Students meetings. . The institution tries to incorporate innovative ways of modifying the internal assessments oral examinations and viva verse are conducted as part of these measures. Advanced learners are advised to help the weak learners in identifying the difficult areas and assisting them in the same. Some departments conduct online examinations to give the students an edge in their preparation for online entrance examinations and career entry examinations.

The academic calendar and examination schedule are prepared at the beginning of each academic year. An action plan is prepared by each department at the beginning of each semester. The department organizes meetings of the teachers to chalk out the curricular and extracurricular activities of each semester. Duties are assigned to each teacher to ensure the smooth implementation of the action plan. Monthly targets are set for the completion of the portions. Based on the action plans inputs from the departments, the college prepares academic calendar , making the dates for the internal examinations and the observation of special days in the calendar. Sunitha Joseph, Coordinator of the centre and PGDCP holder (Post Graduate Diploma in Counselling and Psycho- therapy) meet the students in the free hours and consult the cases. Yearly counselling camps are organised for the first year students in which external professional Counsellors also participate through such sessions, students get an orientation towards the necessity of counselling for a healthy life. In certain cases, counselling facilities are given to the parents also. The practice of counselling and psychotherapy depends on gaining and honouring the trust of clients. The students feel free and comfort with the counselling. 2. Peer teaching - The tutors identify the learning ability of the students by proper internal assessment and mentoring. Both groups of students are equally treated by the tutors by initiating the ''student teacher" programme among them. Some departments give cash awards and recognition to those student teachers on the basis of their active involvement. We have a formal and informal system for this. The students who are more efficient always support the fellow students to come forward. Some departments follow the system of advanced learners among the senior students teaching the junior ones. Normally the teachers identify a leader in each group and he/ she will be the person

having a good score in internal assessment. Informally, before the exams, students prefer group studies and the college provides the classrooms for their group studies. The advanced learners share the value points and important concepts with the slow learners. Practical project works are also done as group work in BBA.
