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#### **Preface**

Established in 1981, by Sreekandapuram Educational Society, S.E.S College, Sreekandapuram envisages to cater to the academic aspirations of people in the rural and hilly areas of Kannur district, which mainly include the panchayats of Sreekandapuram, Malapattanam, Mayyil, Irikkur, Padiyoor, Payyavoor, Eruvessi, Naduvil, Chengalayi and Kurumathur.

The College had a humble beginning in 1981 by offering pre-degree courses affiliated to Calicut University. In 1991, the college was upgraded to a Degree college by offering undergraduate course in Mathematics. After delinking of pre-degree courses, more degree courses were added in arts, science and commerce streams. Currently the college offers eight undergraduate courses and two post graduate courses with a strength of around 790 students in its roll.

From its inception, the college has made big strides of progress under the visionary guidance of Sri. K. M. Varghese, the Founder President of Sreekandapuram Educational Society and Manager of the college. It is our earnest hope that the dynamic leadership of Sri. Vinil Varghese, the present President of the Society and the Manager of the college, and the Board of Directors, added to the untiring efforts of the Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff will enable the college climb greater heights of excellence.

# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY- SWOC ANALYSIS OF S.E.S COLLEGE SREEKANDAPURAM

Sreekandapuram Educational Society is a secular body of more than thousand members from various walks of life. The governing body is democratically elected. Sri. K.M. Varghese was elected as the first president of the society. Twenty five acres of land was donated by the local people for beginning the new college. In a small building the first batches of pre-degree classes were started in the month of October 1981. The seed of fulfilling the dreams of an economically backward society for higher education was sown in a meeting of a few people held at Sreekandapuram in 1976. A steering committee was formed in the meeting headed by Sri .K.M. Varghese, a vibrant and renowned social activist. The committee registered a new society named Sreekandapuram Educational Society which started working for the beginning of a new college in Sreekandapuram. After five years of rigorous attempts by the society, government of Kerala sanctioned a junior college with two batches of Pre-degree courses. With this humble beginning, SES College flourished to the present stature through various stages. The college was upgraded to a first grade degree college in 1991 with the introduction of B.Sc. Mathematics. Later on seven more degree courses were added. In 2013 the college scaled another height by adding two PG courses, M.C.J. and M.com.

#### Vision and Mission

The motto of the Institution "Lead Kindly Light" encapsulates the vision of the college. It is to enkindle the light of knowledge and lead the people of this backward area to the light of wisdom. The under privileged people of this locality were denied opportunities for higher education for a very long period. Thus, the establishment of S.E.S College marked a new era of enlightenment in the history of Sreekandapuram and surrounding villages. The institution succeeded, to a great extent, in imparting quality education to the marginalised people of a vast area.

The mission of the college is to provide quality education to the rural student community. As an institution of higher education, S.E.S College shoulders the high responsibility of uplifting the educationally impoverished,

economically and socially backward community. The academic community of the college, together with parents and the society, is working hard to achieve the goals and fulfil the mission.

The college has made remarkable strides in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The numerous ranks, high pass percentage and prizes in sports and arts underline the glorious trail in academic and extracurricular activities.

The college aims at a holistic development of the students and ensures excellent academic standards. Our teachers are committed to their profession and keep abreast by attending orientation and refresher courses. Moreover, most of the teachers are active in research activities. We have a total of 19 Associate Professors, 10 Assistant Professors and 9 Guest Lecturers in the Aided stream and 11 Lecturers in the Self Financing stream. Total strength of Non-teaching staff is 17 in the Aided stream and 4 in the Self Financing stream. Sanctioned student strength is 791.



Moreover, the objectives, together with the vision and mission are communicated to the stakeholders through orientation programmes. These are also mentioned in the college calendar and prospectus.

Our emblem comprises of a sacred lamp, a pair of ears of paddy and an open book with the motto "LEAD KINDLY LIGHT' beneath it. The lighted lamp symbolizes our vision, the open book represents the mission and objectives, and the pair of ears of paddy, according to Kerala tradition, indicates the prosperity and happiness resulting from knowledge and wisdom.

The curriculum designed by the affiliating university (Kannur University) is effectively implemented through the following practices

- A master time table and separate department time tables are prepared
- All Teachers prepare a work diary at the commencement of every semester for effective and time bound completion of syllabus.
- The work diary is monitored by the concerned HOD and the Principal.
- Course wise internal examinations are conducted at regular intervals.
- We meticulously conduct model examinations before the commencement of university examinations at the end of every semester.
- Students are given academic assignments.
- Students are given opportunities to present papers in seminars.
- Special classes and extra classes are arranged on holidays to compensate teaching hours lost due to various reasons (Hartal, flood, strikes etc.)
- 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?
  - All departments are given computers, and LCD projectors are made available.
  - A well-equipped smart class room and a language lab are arranged.
  - Fully furnished computer labs with internet facility are provided

- College provides free Wi-Fi facility
- Spacious, well ventilated and well lit general library with broad band internet connection
- Departments receive grants from the management for conducting seminars and other programmes
- Financial support from PTA for various programmes
- College encourages teachers to attend refresher and orientation courses, seminars, workshops and various other academic programmes.

In the academic year 2009-10, Kannur University introduced Choice Based Credit and Semester System for all UG Programmes. Consequently the Syllabi and curriculum were redesigned to suit the new system. Many of the faculty members participated in designing and structuring of the curriculum. The curriculum designed by the university is effectively delivered by the college through various steps.

We prepare an annual academic plan, a college calendar, and a master time table. Based on the master time table, department wise time tables are prepared. Meetings, both college level and department level, are regularly conducted for monitoring and solving issues related to curriculum delivery. The management supports infrastructural developments and professional upgrading. Staff vacancies are filled in time for effective transaction of the curriculum. Various departments conduct seminars and other programmes to give exposure to students and teachers. Teachers are encouraged to attend orientation programmes and refresher courses. They also avail opportunities to attend and present papers in National Seminars and workshops. As the campus is a free Wi-Fi enabled zone, teachers and students get access to internet for academic purpose. Feedback is obtained from the outgoing students to improve the delivery mechanism of the curriculum.

- 4. Hobby kits.

It helps the students to engage in research activities and getting jobs in the fields of quality control. The courses offered are:

- Purity checking of chemical compounds ( Thin layer Chromatography )
- 2. Preparation of various standard solutions and chemical reagents.
- 3. Analyzing various metals, minerals, and vitamins in fruits.
- 4. Creating water fountains using Hydrochloric acid gas.

# Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options

The College follows the Choice Based Credit & Semester System offered by the Kannur University. In the Core subjects we have options to choose an elective course. Out of two complementary courses offered by the University, one is compulsory and the other is optional. In common courses English is compulsory. The University offers a wide range of languages such as Hindi, Malayalam, Sanskrit etc. for the other common course. There are a large number of Open Courses offered by

the University which provides maximum inter disciplinary flexibility.

• Courses offered in modular form

In U G and P G programmes, all courses offered are in modular form.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility

The University permits credit transfer when a student seeks transfer from one college to another under the same University.

 Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses.

The lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses is permitted only in the case of Open Courses. Students of one department can choose the open course offered by another department of the same college or another college.

• Enrichment courses

The institution offers ASAP, WWS and SSP for students.

All teachers who are members of various academic bodies of the

University take all efforts to integrate institution's goals and objectives with the curriculum and syllabi of the University. Institution promotes teachers' participation in all the academic bodies. The Chairman of Board of Studies in English (UG, 2013-15) is from our college, who is also a member of PG Board of Studies in English, Faculty of Language and Literature, Steering Committee for restructuring CCSS Scheme and Syllabi, Subcommittee for finalisation of Regulations of UG Programmes and Coordinator of the Workshop for redesigning the Scheme and Syllabi of all English courses of Under Graduate Programmes of Kannur University. The Chairman of Board of Studies in Electronics (UG & PG, 2013-15) and the Chairman of Board of Studies in Electronics and Communication (UG, 2013-15) are also from our college The Chairman of Board of Studies in Mathematics (UG, 2011-13) was from our college. He was also a member of PG Board of Studies in Mathematics (2011-13). Fifteen other teachers are also members of various academic bodies of the university. Feedback from stakeholders is discussed among the faculty before restructuring scheme and syllabi.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Within the limited flexibility, institution takes all efforts to enrich and organize the curriculum as to cater to the needs of the dynamic employment market. Incorporation of Applied Electronics and Python Program in UG Programme in Physics, Communicative English for all U G Programmes and many other courses are the results of the efforts by the teachers of our institution who are members of various academic bodies of the University.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the crosscutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Human Rights, Environmental Education, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

A Women Cell is functioning in the college to cater to the needs

of girl students. We also provide a retiring room for them. The institution is keen on gender issues. We give equal opportunity for boys and girls. The nominal roll of each class is prepared on alphabetic order, not based on gender.

A 'Nature Club' is functioning in the college which is keen on educating students about the nature conservation, climatic change, pollution etc. It played an important role in planting trees in the campus as well as in many locations in Sreekandapuram Grama Panchayath. The Nature Club organizes nature study camps every year in association with the Department of Forest, Government of Kerala. In association with Srekandapuram Grama Panchayath, the college undertakes a project to protect the banks of "Mukkannithodu"- a tributary of "Kottoor river". We have planted 100 bamboo saplings to prevent serious landslides on the banks of Mukkannithodu.

The institution is equipped with two computer centres, smart class room, language lab etc. The campus is enabled with Wi-Fi.

## employable and life skills

A Language lab is functioning in the institution to improve the communication skill of the students.

Students have been selected as trainees for ASAP (Additional Skill Acquisition Programme)- a programme sponsored by the State Government.

The institution arranges training programmes for students in various institutions and industries.

The institution provides various classes on personality development, group discussion, interview etc.

### • better career options

The following organizations are functioning in the college for better career options.

- 1) A career guidance cell
- 2) Entrepreneurship development club
- 3) Campus recruitment cell
- community orientation

The college actively participates in tribal rehabilitation process. We have constructed a 520 sq.ft. house for a poor, seven member tribal family at Thirunelly in Wayanad district, under the project "Home for Homeless". The expense for the entire construction is met by the staff and students of the college. Selected staff and students actively participated in the construction work. The ministers participated in the inauguration of the house, nominated our institution as a nodal agency to construct houses for tribal families.

"River Protection Project" gives students opportunities to interact with the public.

The Dept. of Commerce conducted a survey of the performance of "Kudumbasree" (a unit for the empowerment of women) in Sreekandapuram Gramma Pachayath.

A blood donor's forum is functioning in the college.

The N.S.S & N.C.C units engage in various community welfare activities.

In each programme, the Institution takes feedback from students and parents.

#### STUDENTS:

The Head of each department collects students' feedback. Discussions on the feedback are conducted among the faculty members and a co-ordinated recommendation is conveyed to various academic bodies of the University through the members from the institution

#### **PARENTS**

Regular, class wise meetings of parents, teachers and students are held in each semester. In these meetings parents and students get opportunity for the evaluation of curriculum, teaching and learning process.

Several suggestions from these meetings are incorporated in the curriculum design and syllabus revision

Feedback from participants help the institution to evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes like seminars, workshops, debates, quiz competitions, sports and games. Moreover, the feedback collected from the participants reveal that enrichment programmes like seminars, workshops etc. are very effective and useful for the students.

## 1.4 Feedback System

Almost all departments of the institution have members in various Boards of Studies, Board of Examinations and other academic bodies of the University. They actively participate in designing and developing the curriculum. Incorporation of Applied Electronics and Python Program in UG Programme in Physics, Communicative English for all U G Programmes and many other courses are the results of the efforts by the teachers of our institution who are members of various academic bodies of the University.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes. Each department collects feedback on curriculum from students through response sheet and oral response. Parents and Alumni are given chances to express their views on curriculum. Suggestions from students, alumni and parents are communicated to the University through members of different Board of Studies and other academic bodies.

The introduction of common courses in B B A programme is an example for the above. The syllabi for U G Physics were revised in unison with the PG syllabi. We were also successful in introducing environmental studies and disaster management in common courses of various programmes.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

As one of the best practices followed by the institution, we go on adding new courses in the college. Four courses were added during the last two years. Two of them are in the aided stream and two of them in the self-financing stream

The new programmes introduced in the institution during the last four years are:

#### 1. **M.C.J.**

The first aided P G programme of our college is M.C.J which started in October 2013. This is the only aided P G programme in Communication and Journalism in Kannur University. All over Kerala, there are only three colleges having aided P G programme in Communication and Journalism including our institution. This programme is intended to mould competent professionals in communication and journalism blended with technical and intellectual capability in the fast developing communication sector.

The fee structure of the programme encourages even the poor students of this rural area to join the programme.

Master of Communication and Journalism opens a wide range of career opportunities both in public and private sectors like: Teaching, Print Media, Audio Media, Audio Visual Media and New Media, Public Relations, Corporate Communications and Advertising, Business Journalism, Fashion Journalism, Farm Journalism, Sports Journalism, Cinema etc. Professional skill training in Digital Media, Photography, Photo Editing, Print Layout and Design, Audio Recording and Editing, Cinematography, Video Editing etc.

## 2. **M.Com.**

There is a growing demand for PG courses in commerce subjects. Thus, the institution started M.Com (Finance) programme which provides an opportunity to acquire advanced knowledge in the main areas of commerce to help them in their career development. The department arranges periodical guest lectures, and field visits to strengthen the learning of the subject and to expose the students to the

actual work situations. They are well trained with different skills like logical thinking, effective public speaking, analytical skills and IT skills to equip them for facing the highly competitive business world.

#### 3. **B.Com.**

B.Com. programme was introduced in our college in 2014. This programme was sanctioned as a result of the increasing demand for commerce subjects among students. We hope this programme will provide better career opportunities for the students of our institution.

B.Com programme is intended to provide advanced knowledge in Commerce specializations and it aims to equip students with the knowledge and competence in the field of business and commerce to pursue professional career and further higher education in the field of commerce.

After graduation in commerce, aspirants have a wide range of options for higher studies. They can do post-graduation in any of the streams like Economics, Statistics, Law, Arts, Insurance, Education, International studies etc.

Other professional programmes of study include:

M.B.A, M.C.A, P.G.D.M, C.A, C.S, C.M.A etc.

#### Career opportunities after B.Com.

After successful completion of the B.Com. programme, students have a better—job prospect in finance, marketing, international business, human resources etc. They can seek for career opportunities in public and private—undertakings and also can join in banking sector in the clerical and probationary officer posts. They can attend UPSC examinations, Combined Defense Service Examinations, Air Force Accountants Examinations etc.

## 4. **B.C.A.**

The BCA program was started in the year 2013. The course is designed to bridge the gap between IT industries and institutes by incorporating the latest developments in to the curriculum. An exclusive and well equipped lab for the department with a network of latest microprocessor based computers and software installed, provides hands – on training in a variety of computer applications



# **CRITERION II:**

## TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

#### 2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The admission to various programmes of the institution is strictly on the basis of the rules and timely directions of the Kannur University and the Government of Kerala. The dates for issue of application forms, closing of application forms, publication of merit list, interview, closing of admission etc. are decided and announced by the University through newspapers, University website and visual media. The college also publishes these dates in local newspapers, radio and the institutional website.

The merit list and waiting list are published both on the college notice board and college website. Each student in the merit list and waiting list are intimated well in advance by post. On the date of interview, students and their parents are invited to assemble in a hall where they can verify the rank list once again. A committee including Principal, concerned HOD and office staff verify the documents and give admission. If the vacancies are not completely filled from the merit list, students from the waiting list are admitted.

60% of the seats is in the open merit quota, 20% is reserved for SC/ST and 20% is allotted to Management Quota. As per the Kerala state government rule, Differently abled and sports persons are given reservations.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The admission to both P G and UG programmes are on merit basis. A rank list is prepared on the basis of marks/grade in the qualifying examinations. The index mark for the rank list is prepared in the following manner

#### 1. U G Programme

The total marks/grade of the qualifying examination is added to the marks/grade of the subject selected for the U G programme. Grace marks are awarded for students having valid certificates in N C C, N S S etc.. Students from Kannur district are also given grace marks in calculating the index marks. The norms of the grace marks are given by the University and state government

### 2. P G Programme

The total marks/grade of the qualifying examination is added to the marks/grade of the subject selected for the P G programme. Grace marks are awarded for students having valid certificates in N C C , N S S etc. Students from Kannur district are also given grace marks in calculating the index marks. The norms of the grace marks are given by the University and state government.



However, SC/ST students having higher index mark are admitted in General Merit itself. All the SC/ST students, irrespective of the category of admission, are exempted from paying fees. They are also given scholarships.



The table shows slight fluctuations in the number of applicants for different programmes over the last four years. In the first two years of the period, there is an increase in the number of applicants for science programmes. However in the last two years, the trend has changed towards Arts and Commerce programmes. This is mainly due to more opportunities in the respective fields. Taking this into consideration, we have started more programmes in arts and commerce subjects.

# 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this

regard?

The institution abides by the Govt. policy, strictly adhering to the existing norms for reserving seats for the differently abled students. Presently, 3 % of the total seats is reserved for differently abled students. The institution takes special interest in supporting these students by providing them maximum care academically and physically. Extra time both for practical sessions and examinations is provided. Various departments provide easy chairs and financial assistance to the needy students of this category. The institution has taken steps to arrange classes in the ground floor itself for them. Moreover, ramps have been made wherever necessary.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The institution assesses the students' needs in terms of knowledge acquisition and skill development before the commencement of the programme. At the time of interview, the head of the department clarifies the doubts of the students and their guardians on any academic matter. An orientation programme is conducted for the newcomers. Students give their personal details in a tutorial card which helps the tutor assess various needs and talents of the students. During the course, remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners. Moreover, the feedback taken from the outgoing students every year help the institution to understand and solve the needs of the students

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The orientation programme for the newcomers conducted on the first day help them to familiarize them with the rules and regulations of the institution. In the initial stages, tutors and teachers explain various aspects of the course and assess the knowledge gap of the enrolled students. Slow learners are provided with remedial coaching and additional lecture notes and other materials. The syllabi and curriculum is explained in detail in the initial stages itself so that the students will get a clear idea about the programme of their own choice. The new initiative by the Higher Education Council of Kerala viz. Scholar Support Programme (SSP) has been introduced in our college to help the academically weak students

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The syllabi and curriculum provided by the affiliating university includes a good number of topics on issues like gender, inclusion, environment etc. In our institution, we have various clubs like Nature Club, Women's Cell etc. for sensitizing the staff and students on issues like gender, environment etc. Every year, organize nature study camps at various wildlife sanctuaries in Kerala. Seminars are conducted on gender issues which also help the staff and students to be aware of gender issues and work out solutions for the problems existing in and outside the campus. The Govt. directions and rules are strictly followed by institution in reserving seats for the marginalized communities. Financial assistance, remedial coaching etc. are provided to the weaker sections of the Various community. programmes conducted in the college help the students of marginalized community to join the mainstream.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution has introduced "Walk With a Scholar"

Programme, a new initiative of the Higher Education Council of Kerala. It helps the advanced brilliant students to channelize their dreams and career prospects with the help of scholar from the respective field. The institution helps the students to avail all opportunities for participating in quiz competitions, competitive examinations etc. A spacious and well-furnished library, high speed internet facility with Wi-Fi etc. help advanced learners to pursue their academic goals.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The dropout of the students occur mainly due to two reasons; marriage of girl students and employment. In case of drop outs, due to other reasons, like physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. the institution takes special care to include them by financially helping them, remedial coaching and other requirements. Fortunately, giving we don't face the problem of dropouts caused by these reasons. In the case of dropouts due to marriage, the institution has limitations. However, teachers advice the parents and guardians of such students to continue their education even after marriage.

# 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The institution meticulously plans and organizes the teaching,

learning and evaluation schedules through the following processes.

- An academic calendar is prepared in the beginning of every academic year in accordance to the university calendar.
- All teachers prepare semester—wise teaching plan and keep a work diary which is monitored by the HODs and the Head of the institution regularly. This work diary helps the teacher to plan and organize various academic programmes to be completed in a semester.
- The hours lost due to various reasons (hartal, strike etc.) are compensated by special classes and extra classes on holidays. Study tours and such co-curricular activities are conducted on holidays.
- Model examinations are conducted at the end of every semester, prior to the university examination. Besides, departments conduct unit tests, class tests etc. as per their timetable.
- The college has a master timetable and each department has their department time table for the smooth conduct of classes.
- An hourly attendance is taken every day which is reviewed weekly and consolidated semester wise.
- Class wise PTA meetings are conducted at the end of every semester to discuss academic standings and other matters.
- 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The college IQAC, established on 1st July 2014, helps various departments to conduct seminars and workshops. The IQAC acts as an advisory body for academic and co-curricular activities. The IQAC identifies the academic and infrastructural needs of the institution and takes necessary steps to fulfill them. The IQAC also acts as a link between the academic community and

the management. Moreover, the IQAC sees that all departments are provided with computers, LCD projectors, and other equipment needed for teaching, learning process.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

With the implementation of Choice based Credit and Semester learning became more student centric. Besides lecture hours, students are directed to present seminars, projects and assignments on various topics in the syllabus. The CCSS urges the students to depend more on library and other sources of information for their academic pursuit. The institution provides all essential support structures and systems both for teachers and students to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among students. The wellfurnished computer lab and language lab provide opportunities for interactive learning. Industrial visits, industrial training and provide opportunities for collaborative learning. Finally, the college library and internet facility help the students for independent learning.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The syllabus introduced in 2009 included a Common Course paper in English viz. Critical Reasoning and Academic Presentation Skills

The institution as such and various departments independently conduct debates, discussions, seminars, workshops etc. to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students. Besides, the college magazine and class publications

are brought out to give space for creative writers. A good number of students have participated in the university level competitions for creative writing. The college prompts the students to participate in competitions conducted by the Institute of Parliamentary Affairs. The practical sessions by various Departments, create scientific temper among the students. Projects and assignments transform the students into life long learners and innovators.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, elearning-resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

As the institution is in its growing stage, it makes all efforts to subscribe INFLIBNET for teachers and students. Departments are provided with computers and Wi-Fi connectivity. We have a Language lab, a computer lab and a smart class room for more effective teaching-learning process. A spacious and well-furnished General Library helps teachers to update their knowledgebase. L.C.D. projectors are used for various teaching-learning purposes.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

Various departments conduct seminars and workshops to expose teachers and students to latest trends. Teachers also participate in seminars and workshops conducted by other colleges, universities and other agencies.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the

academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The Tutorial system is a great help to students. Every student is a tutor for personal attention. Besides, Counseling placed under Camps conducted in the college help the students support from trained Counselors in the district. Remedial Coaching Classes are conducted for slow learners. **Teachers** financially support poor students to help them continue their studies. Moreover, the College also provides scholarships to economically weaker but academically promising students, sponsored by Indian Jeevakarunya Charitable Trust.

'Walk With Scholar' and 'Scholar a Support Programme' provide Opportunities to many students to excel in their academic pursuit. We have a Students' Aid Fund with the contribution from students to help the poor students. Various Endowments like P.T.A. Endowment, Prof. K.J. Kuriakose Endowment, N.S.S Endowment, Joet Jose Memorial Endowment, etc. offer scholarships to students belonging to different categories. Various Clubs and Forums functioning in the College are also helpful to the students.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The institution has smart classrooms, Language Lab, and Computer Lab for innovative teaching approaches. All departments are provided with L.C.D Projectors which make teaching a new experience for teachers. Under C.C.S.S., students present seminars, and teaching learning process become more student centric. Industrial visits and Projects are also part of

innovative teaching approaches. Through interactive classes, assignments, projects, seminars and practical sessions, the institution promotes student centric learning. Movies and documentaries related to curriculum are exhibited so that teaching learning process become effective and entertaining. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled which makes e-learning more accessible.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The spacious and well-arranged library is a great help to both the teachers of the institution. The library has a good students and number of books. journals and periodicals. The Reference collection of recent section of the Library has a good and authentic books. There is also a provision for free internet facility. A Reading Lounge with subscription of leading dailies and journals is meant to keep the staff and students abreast with the latest social, academic and universal changes.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The socio political atmosphere in the state of Kerala causes many problems in the educational scenario. The recurring harthals, strikes and floods during monsoon season steal away a chunk of working days. However, our institution takes special steps to see that portions are completed within the planned time frame. Special classes on holidays and extra hours on working days help us finish our classes in the stipulated time. With the introduction of semester system, we are compelled to find extra time for co-curricular activities. We make all efforts to see that the students of this backward area are never deprived of their right to have all portions taught well in advance before the University examinations.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Our institution has a meticulous system for monitoring and evaluating the quality of teaching learning process. The feedback taken from the outgoing students help the teachers themselves and bring necessary changes in their approach. Test papers and model examinations are conducted systematically at evaluate the efficacy of our teaching regular intervals to examinations reach learning process. The mark lists of all these the Head of the institution through the H.O.D.s. Class P.T.A.s help the entire system to be effective. Regular staff meetings and Council Meetings discuss various aspects of teaching learning process and take corrective measures if needed. Regular parent teacher contact is a remarkable feature of our institution. **Tutorial** system helps teachers to understand problems faced by students

The recruitment of teaching staff is done strictly as per the norms of UGC, State Government and Kannur University. Vacancies are advertised in leading National Dailies inviting applications from eligible candidates. The interview board constituted as per the norms of UGC, State Government and University selects meritorious candidates to fill up the vacancies. After appointment, teachers are encouraged to go for higher qualifications like M.Phil. and Ph.D. The knowledge base of the teachers is kept abreast by participating in Refresher Courses, Orientation Programmes, Seminars, Workshops, etc.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas)of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

Our institution takes all necessary steps to fill up vacancies at the earliest. Presently, teachers for the new course MCJ are appointed as guest faculty. The post creation for these vacancies is to be done by the Government of Kerala. However, we have recruited four qualified teachers for the course. Moreover, media persons are invited to deliver lectures on the recent trends in Mass Communication and Journalism. For other courses, we have experienced senior permanent faculty.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

Various Boards of Studies conducted workshops in 2009 and 2014 to familiarize teachers with the new Grading System introduced along with CCSS. Teachers from our institution participated in these workshops and are well informed about the evaluation process. In the beginning of every academic year, teachers explain the entire process of evaluation to the students. Students are educated well in advance about the internal assessment and external evaluation. Parents are also informed about the new Grading System.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Transition from numerical score to alphabetical Grading Scale is reform undertaken by Kannur University .The Grading a major System was introduced by Kannur University in the year 2008 and made a reformation in the year 2009 by introducing Choice Based Credit and Semester System for all U.G. Courses. And our college also follows the CCSS with utmost care in implementing the changes by avoiding any sort of anomalies. The Continuous Evaluation process was also introduced by the University by which the students are continuously assessed by the teachers based on their performance. The tabulation of marks has been computerized and are displayed the notice boards of respective departments. Before sending to the necessary rectifications are made if University,

complaints arise on the preparation of the internal marks. Marks/Grades scored by the students are recorded in the Tutorial Cards by the teacher concerned and are reported to the parents during the P.T.A. meetings.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The students are continuously assessed by the teachers in the present CCSS. The assessment is based on the components of the internal examination, attendance, seminar presentation, viva voce, submission of assignments, etc. A model examination is conducted prior to the End Semester examination which gives the students an experience on how to face the external exam. An Examination Committee is formed with a senior teacher as the Coordinator to ensure the proper conduct of the exams. The final internal assessment score is calculated as a cumulative average of the components mentioned above. The grade points are displayed on the notice boards of each department and rectifying measures are taken if necessary, Moreover, the respective H.O.Ds are vested with the responsibility of making sure that no personal attachments or detachments influence the preparation of internal marks. Most teachers have participated in the workshops and training programmes on the new system of evaluation and grading, conducted by the university. A course coordinator is appointed and an Examination committee is nominated for the smooth conduct of evaluation process.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

#### **Formative Assessment Approach**

The Formative assessment is done completely based on the

continuous assessment made by the teachers. Test papers, Seminars, Assignments, Viva voce, Attendance, etc. are the components for the Formative Assessment. Moreover, the performance of students in the classroom is also assessed.

#### **Summative Assessment Approach**

The conduct of Summative Evaluation is fully vested on the University. Before the commencement of every academic year, Kannur University prepares an Examination Calendar which is the guideline for every affiliated college on the schedule of examinations.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

The institution takes all efforts to ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment by strictly adhering to university norms. Both the students and the parents are well educated about various components (internal examinations, attendance, seminars, assignments etc.) for calculating the grade of internal assessment. The records of the grades obtained by each student in all components are kept in the departments and communicated to both students and parents. As a result, students maintain maximum percentage of attendance and take internal examinations seriously. We have a meticulous system of internal examinations which is as important as the end semester examinations. The net result of this system is better grades in the internal assessment. The grades/marks of internal assessment are displayed on the notice board and signature is obtained from all students at least one week prior to sending the grade sheet to the university. This facilitates the students to lodge their grievances, if any, before the Grievance Cell.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

As the college exists in a socio-economic backward area, the prime objective of it is to uplift the educationally impoverished, economically and socially backward community. With this aim, the college strives to bring out the holistic development of the students and raise them to excellent academic standards. The numerous ranks, high pass percentage and prizes in sports and arts prove that it has never gone back in fulfilling its graduate attributes.

There is a Convener for the Cell and all the H.O.Ds are members of the Cell.

And the motto is materialized by providing quality education to the under privileged youth of the agrarian rural community who were denied opportunities for higher education for a very long period. Our college shoulders the high responsibility of uplifting the educationally impoverished, economically and socially backward community. The curriculum and dissemination of knowledge is channelized in such a way that the overall

development of the students is achieved.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the

intended learning outcomes?

The institution has a systematic approach to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes. Departments prepare department timetable in accordance with the master timetable of the college. Every teacher maintains a work diary to plan the smooth and timely conduct of classes. Special care is taken in completing portions within the stipulated time. Along with class have a meticulous model examination level test papers we system, which is as important as the University examination. Internal assessment is based on various components like internal examinations, seminars, viva, attendance etc. Entire process is monitored by the HODs and head of the institution. Students are assigned various academic duties like seminar presentations, preparation of projects etc. which always keep them in touch with the syllabi and curriculum. The results of various examinations are discussed among various bodies like P T A, staff council, and department staff meetings and take necessary steps to improve the results. Moreover, the institution takes all steps to ensure the achievement of the intended learning outcomes.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

As our college offered only U G programmes till recently, most of the students opt for higher education like P G and B.Ed. However we take all measures to place our students in the right stream after the completion of their graduation. The college placement cell helps the students to gather information regarding job opportunities and career options. The cell also brings various companies for campus recruitment. We have a career guidance cell in our college. Students are encouraged to take innovative steps and research aptitude through the projects assigned to them as part of their syllabus.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The tutorial system in the college is very effective in collecting and analyzing the performance and learning outcomes of the students. Every student is placed under a tutor, throughout the entire programme. The tutor keeps a tutorial card which contains all personal details of the student. The academically poor students are given special attention. Department level discussions on student performance and results help the teachers plan and overcome barriers of learning.

We keep a register in each department to record the results of all examinations of each student, which facilitates comparative study. The results are discussed with parents and institution takes all steps to improve them. Suggestions from students and parents are given utmost importance. The head of the institution and all monitor the entire teaching learning process. Special **HODs** academically weaker students to bring attention is given to them to the mainstream. Special coaching is also offered for difficult subject.

Yes. The results are taken as an indicator for evaluating student performance. The analysis of results at various levels brings out the drawbacks of existing teaching learning process. We take all possible steps to correct these drawbacks to improve the results.

Though the college is situated in a rural area, our results are often better than that of the University average. However we take all steps to improve student performance in the academic field.

# Other relevant information regarding Teaching-Learning and Evaluation;

The socio political background and economic backwardness pose many challenges before us. Our students are deprived of many facilities enjoyed by the students of other institutions. The management and staff joined hands to give transport facility for the students. This helps students of remote areas to spend more time in the college for extra classes and library works. The teachers engage special classes on holidays to avail maximum time for teaching.

The academic forum urges all teachers to engage in research works. As a result, during the last few years, most of the teachers have registered or started their research works. Of the three teachers who submitted their Ph.D. thesis, one teacher is already awarded Ph.D. The Academic Forum facilitates teachers to participate in International and National seminars. Moreover, the initiatives from the IQAC and Academic Forum helped all departments to organize seminars during the seminar series titled "CONVERGENCE". As suggested by the IQAC and Academic Forum, the general library is renovated, practical lab facilities improved, campus became Wi-Fi enabled, Language lab started functioning and more computers are added to the computer lab.

Our policy is to promote consultancy by maintaining constant relationship with various industries. Our institution provides all available facilities to the staff and students for consultancy services.

# 3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

Being in a rural area, our institution has a very strong

relationship with the neighbouring community. A sincere and strong participation of the college community is always there in the social activities of the neighbourhood and vice versa. To nurture service orientation good citizenship, and holistic development of students, we have a variety of activities and programmes. Various clubs and forums in the college organize social programmes like 'Clean and Green City', 'A Helping Hand', 'River Protection', 'Home for Homeless', etc. Nature Club, N.S.S., N.C.C. and the college community as a whole engage in various social activities reiterating our commitment to the society. We have mainly identified and focused three areas for our extension activities - Nature conservation, Tribal welfare and Charity. Nature Club of the College regularly conducts Nature Study Camps in various Wildlife sanctuaries and National parks to inculcate love for nature among students and staff. Both the students and staff have participated in the wildlife census conducted by the Forest Department. River protection is a major project taken up by the institution. Helping the poor, within and outside the institution is a routine programme in the college. Visiting the poor homes, old age homes, shelter for the outcast etc. is a regular practice of the academic community in the institution. The entire community of the college stood together to fulfill our dream project "Home for the Homeless". In this Project, we have constructed a house for a tribal family. The enthusiasm of the students encourages us to continue the project.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements/activities which promote citizenship roles?

The institution has a very strong mechanism to ensure the involvement of students in various social movements and activities capable of promoting citizenship. All students are brought under one or the other organization/forum/club meant for social activities.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

We solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution through feedback from students, suggestions from parents and the neighbouring community. We give maximum attention to their opinion and take necessary action

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

The institution has many clubs and organizations for extension activities. We have a committee for coordinating extension activities. Apart from the usual charity activities, we have undertaken three major projects.

- 1. "Home for Homeless". A house for a tribal family is completed spending Rs 2.6 lakh. The fund was raised from among staff and students of the college.
- 2. "The River Protection Project". Aiming to protect the river Mukkannithode from landslide and encroachment, one hundred bamboo saplings are planted on the banks of the river.
- 3. "Free Coaching Camp". Department of Physical Education of SES College conducted eight day long free coaching camp for school students in Basketball and Volleyball.
- 3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/ International agencies?

The institution promotes the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, Nature Club etc. by giving orientation programmes and advocating the benefits of extension and outreach

programmes. Moreover, students get grace marks for participating in such activities. The certificates given to the participants give them an edge over others in the society.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

Our staff and students visited a tribal colony in Thirunelly in Wayanad district and interacted with the people of the colony. We could persuade a few of them to join school and come to the mainstream. A blood donation camp was conducted in SES College Sreekandapuram on 29th August, 2014. Eighty students made the camp successful by voluntarily donating their blood to the Blood Bank of Govt. General Hospital Thalassery.

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

The extension activities organized by the institution are mainly bifocal. The first one is to provide physical and social help to the community and the second and even more important one is the achievement of the students in terms of good citizenship and holistic development. These attributes aptly complement students' academic learning experience. Our extension activities help the students inculcate values of social commitment, good citizenship, love for nature and compassion to fellow beings. These social activities provide the students opportunities to develop the skills to analyze and solve social issues, issues related to nature and needs of the tribal community. River protection project helps them to learn how to clean a river, how to plant seedlings on the banks of a river etc. The 'Home for Homeless' project helps them in developing the skills necessary for planning and constructing a house.

3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities?

For our Charity initiatives we involve the neighbouring community. The Home for Homeless project is amply supported by the local people of the colony. They offered manpower during the construction of the house. For the protection of the river Mukkannithode, the local people give wholehearted support. Sreekandapuram grama panchayath also joins hands with us in this project

We collaborate with Lions Club of Sreekandapuram to give free medical assistance to the local people and the students of the college

A Blood Donors' Forum is constituted in S.E.S. College, Sreekandapuram by Health Fitness and sports club of SES College Sreekandapuram and Blood Bank of Govt. General Hospital Thalasseri to donate blood for the needy. The functioning of this forum is well informed to the neighbouring community, especially to the hospitals in Sreekandapuram.

River Protection project is a joint venture of Sreekandapuram grama panchayath and the college

College NSS units conducted various extension activities in collaboration with GHSS Malapattam and GHSS Chuzhali.

3.6.10 Give details of awards received by the institution for extension activities and contributions to the social/community development during the last four years.

The best and the most coveted award for our extension activities came from the right persons at the right time. The two ministers participated in the House Warming ceremony of the house for a tribal family at Thirunelly, appreciated our extension activities as the best practice of the institution that can be followed by other institutions. Both the ministers remarked that the house we built is better with respect to cost, facilities, area and beauty, than that of the houses built by the government. As a recognition, they nominated our institution as a nodal agency to construct twenty houses for tribal families using Rs.50 lakhs allotted by the government.

#### 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The Management and the administrative authorities are very keen on creating and enhancing infrastructure facilities for teaching and learning. With UGC assistance we have built a spacious and well-furnished library, and increased the number of books. We have established a language lab with U G C assistance. Management spends huge amount of money for creating and enhancing infrastructure facilities in the campus. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled for free internet access. All possible efforts are taken to avail financial assistance from various agencies to create and develop infrastructure.

#### 4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities—classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

Currently we have eight U.G programmes and two P.G Programmes. Separate and well-furnished classrooms are available for all these courses.

There is one smart-class room, which is used by all departments in turn. Two fully furnished computer labs, a language lab, seminar hall, spacious library, laboratories for Science subjects, L C D Projector, Computer and printer for all departments, a powerful telescope for the purpose of Astronomy students etc. are some other facilities made available for curricular and co-curricular activities.

b) Extra –curricular activities – sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, and hygiene etc.

The college has a 400 m track, a sports ground for Hockey, football and cricket, a separate Basket Ball court, a volley ball court, and a Tennis court. Separate rooms are made available for N.S.S & N.C.C. We have an open auditorium with stage for cultural activities. For developing communication skill, we have established a language lab. For medical purposes, we have a separate building.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? The institution has a clearly stated futuristic approach towards infrastructure development. The planning board and the building committee discuss various needs and propose construction of new facilities, enhancement of existing facilities and addition of other essential infrastructure. The institution witnessed tremendous growth in infrastructure facilities. The renovated library, language lab, ladies hostel, smart class room and continuous power supply through solar project are some of the new facilities added to the existing ones.





4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?



The under privileged people of this locality were denied opportunities for higher education for a very long period. Thus, the establishment of SES College marked a new era of enlightenment in the history of Sreekandapuram and surrounding villages. The college succeeded, to a greater extent, in imparting quality education to the marginalised people of a wide area.

The mission of the college is to provide quality education to the rural student community. As an institution of higher education, SES College shoulders the high responsibility of uplifting the educationally impoverished, economically and socially backward community. The academic community of the college, together with parents and the society, is working hard to achieve the goals and fulfil the mission. The vision for the future is a Higher Education Institution par excellence.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The strength of our college is the management. The timely intervention of the management in the daily affairs ensures smooth

functioning of the college. The management committee, which comprises of the manager, board members and the principal, conducts weekly meetings to assess and plan the developmental activities of the college. The management committee has a clear vision about upgrading the academic performance of the college by selecting the most suitable programmes from the university, especially in choosing the programmes suitable for the students of the rural community.

Under the vibrant management, led by young and energetic manager Sri. Vinil Varghese, the college is scaling new heights in terms of academics and infrastructure. A new phase started in the history of the college, when the management conducted a Development Seminar on 28/02/2014 inviting people from all walks of life in the locality. The aim of the seminar was to frame an action plan for the future development of the college. All positive suggestions, aired in the seminar, were accepted by the management. Consequently new courses started, the library facility is enhanced, and infrastructure facilities were added. Above all, the management sponsored a week-long multi-disciplinary National Seminar series conducted in the college from 12/01/2015 to 16/01/2015.

Principal and Faculty plays an important role in designing and implementation of its quality policy and plans. The staff council and IQAC set the parameters for quality policy and plans. The principal takes special attention in appointing guest lecturers. He also monitors and ensures the quality of the academic programmes.

## • Research & Development

The institution takes all steps to promote research

culture. Teachers are provided with all institutional support to engage in research activities. Seminars and workshops are regularly conducted.

## • Community engagement

The institution is committed to community services. The academic community of the college spent Rs2.6 lakh for constructing a house for tribal family. Our staff and students regularly visit and give financial aid to nearby poor homes and old age homes. River protection is a much appreciated project of our college. Our NSS units and NCC regularly engage in community services in the nearby locality.

## • Human resource management

Since our college is in the aided sector, well qualified candidates are appearing for interview and the management selects the best candidate as our faculty. Annual increments and promotions are given as per Government norms. Temporary teachers are appointed in leave vacancies. Management / P.T.A give payment if the period of leave is less than 90 days. The Management encourages staff members to do their duties promptly by facilitating healthy relationship between the staff and the management.

## • Industry interaction

Even though a college in a rural area, the institute is very keen on establishing institute-industry interface. The Department of Chemistry joins hands with agricultural industry. The Dept. of Physics consults with Sia Electronics and Allied Products.

The principal, being the administrative head, communicates all

As directed by the court, the principal forwarded the documents of MRP to UGC. The Deputy Director of Collegiate Education, Kozhikode, ratified the action taken by the principal.
- The petition filed by Smt. Sheela M Joseph, Asso. Prof, Dept. of Physics against the proceedings of the manager on the inadmissible payments of UGC fund sanctioned for National Seminar. Decision is pending.

Institution takes all efforts to avail additional funding from various agencies. UGC has sanctioned an additional fund for the completion of the hostel.

## 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

## 6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes. The college IQAC was established on 1<sup>st</sup>July 2014. The institutional policy with regard to quality assurance is to enhance research facilities, to start more courses and develop infrastructure facilities. The IQAC helps various departments to conduct seminars and workshops. It also acts as an advisory body for academic and co-curricular activities. The IQAC identifies the

academic and infrastructural needs of the institution and takes necessary steps to fulfil them. Moreover, the IQAC sees that all departments are provided with computers, LCD projectors, and other equipment needed for teaching, learning process.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?


Our internal quality assurance mechanisms are well in tune with that of the regulatory authorities. Academic excellence is the need of the hour and we strive hard to achieve this goal

# **CRITERIA VII:**

## INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

## 7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

We haven't conducted a green audit so far, as our construction and projects were planned in such a way as not to cause any imbalance to nature. Except for making the playground, we have made much earthwork for construction. The not environment conscious community of the campus is very enthusiastic to keep the campus green and clean. Once a dry area with laterite terrain, the efforts under the auspices of the Nature Club, converted the entire campus into a green zone by covering the area with loads of soil and planting a variety of trees suitable for the climate of the area.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

## Energy conservation

The college community is conscious about the need for energy conservation. Thus, under the auspices of the department of Physics, a seminar on energy conservation was conducted to motivate both the students and staff to conserve energy for the posterity. We practice the habit of switching off electrical equipment when they are not in use. As our water source is situated at a faraway place, we strictly advocate zero wastage of water.

## • Use of renewable energy

The institution is well aware of the energy crisis in future. We have started a project to tap maximum solar energy for various purposes in the campus. Currently, we generate 5 KVA electricity through the solar panels. As the first phase of this project, the power

for the entire administrative block is generated from the solar panels.

## Water harvesting

Imbibing the meaning of the maxim, "water is the elixir of life", we take all steps to preserve every source of water in our campus. Apart from sensitizing programmes on water conservation, we have started constructing a rain water harvesting project of two crore litre capacity in the campus.

## • Efforts for Carbon neutrality

The quantity of carbon dioxide produced in the campus is minimum. However we have planted trees to neutralize the carbon dioxide.

#### Plantation

Every effort is taken to make the campus green by planting a variety of trees

#### 7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

## • New Programmes

Upgradation of college with the introduction of new P.G. programmes(MCJ and M.Com.) and introduction of new U.G. programmes(B.C.A. and B.Com) have made a tremendous change in the academic culture of the college. Two of them (M.Com. and B.C.A.) are in the self-financing stream.

#### • Uniform dress code for students

Uniform dress code was necessitated by the heterogeneous nature of the student community. As the majority of the students belong to the economically weaker section of the society, the PTA proposed economically viable uniform dress code for students. It helped in establishing equality, a feeling of oneness among students and maintaining discipline.

## Ban on Mobile phones and Ragging

College administration and PTA joined hands to strictly adhere to court verdicts on banning mobile phones and ragging in the campus. This ensured strict discipline in the campus which ultimately reflects in the attitude of the students.

## • Renovated Library

The shifting of General library to a more spacious and convenient location encouraged the students to utilize the library facilities. Well-ventilated and well- furnished general library attract the attention of everyone.

#### • Computer Lab

In addition to the existing computer lab, a separate computer lab is installed for the self-financing section

## • Language Lab

The new language lab is a great help for the students in developing their communication skills.

## Tutorial System

Tutorial system enables the teacher to identify the real strength and weakness of students. Thus, they can be guided in the proper manner.

## • Teachers' Work Diary

Introduction of work diary for teachers helped them in planning the lessons and properly completing the portion within the stipulated time. It helps the Dept. Heads and Head of the Institution to easily monitor the teaching-learning process.

## • Computerized admission process

The computerized admission process helps in making an error rank list of all applicants. Moreover, maintenance of data becomes easier.

## • University model answer booklets

The introduction of university model answer booklets gave more seriousness to model examinations. Students become familiar to the answer booklets, and can save time in the examination hall.

#### • Smart classroom

A smart classroom has been established, which is common to all departments.

## • Uninterrupted Power supply

Uninterrupted power supply is maintained with the help of Solar panel, a generator (diesel) of 15KVA and another one (kerosene) of 2.2KVA.

## • Transport facility

In order to facilitate easy access to the college, two college buses have been arranged. As the college is located in a rural and hilly area, the transportation facility is a real blessing for the students and staff.

#### • Ladies hostel

The college has identified that it is a necessity to establish a ladies hostel as the majority of the students are girls. And with this realization, the Ladies hostel was inaugurated on 19<sup>th</sup> January, 2015. The hostel can accommodate 30 inmates

#### Renovated Canteen

For ensuring maximum cleanliness, we replaced the cement floor with tile and wooden tables with granite tops.

## • New blocks for self-financing section

A new separate block for the self-financing section is constructed for maintaining its uniqueness.

#### • Health Centre

Giving importance to the health of students and staff, a health centre was set up in the college with the co-operation of Nivil Hospital and Lions Club.

#### Wi-fi internet access

The campus is wi-fi enabled and free access to internet helps the students and teachers to update their knowledge base.

#### Computer and DTP facilities in all departments

All the departments are furnished with computer and DTP facilities.

## • LCD Projectors

Most of the Departments are provided with LCD Projectors. This enables both the teachers and students to make PPT presentations and also to get audio-visual assistance when needed.

#### CCTV

In order to ensure the safety and security of the students, the public space of the college has been kept under CCTV surveillance. It also helps to avoid the trespass of strangers to the college.

## Drinking Water Purifier

Provision for pure water has been made through the Drinking Water Purifier.

## Parking Area

A separate parking space for the vehicles of staff and students have been arranged in the campus.

#### • Heat resistant Classroom

False ceiling has been fixed in classrooms to reduce temperature.

# • Lightening arrester

A lightening arrester has been erected at the top of the building to protect the area from lightening hazards.

#### • Girls Restroom

The girls' restroom has been renovated and modified.

## New Entrance and access to college

A new entrance was set up with a path-way and a beautiful gate.

#### • New Initiatives

The State Government sponsored New Initiative Programmes like WWS(Walk With a Scholar), SSP(Scholar Support Programme) and ASAP(Additional Skill Acquisition Programme) has been successfully implemented.

## Moulding a Hockey team

The college has now set up a new hockey team to promote national feeling.

## • Blood Donors' Forum

A Blood Donors' Forum has started functioning in the college which is a helping hand to the patients in critical stage.

## • Green Boards in classrooms

The teaching-learning process has become a new experience with the installation of green boards in all classrooms.

#### Advanced studio

The MCJ Department has a well-equipped studio which enables the students to do their practical sessions in the college itself.

#### 7.3 Best Practices

#### **Best Practice 1**

## 1. Title of the Practice:

## More Programmes, more Facilities.

Being an only aided college in a vast area we add more Programmes and more facilities to fulfill the dream of the people in this area for better higher education with better facilities.

## 2. Goal:

The best practice we adopted in our institution i.e. more programmes, more facilities is aimed at achieving our vision, fulfilling our mission and reaching our objectives. The vision "enkindle the light of knowledge, spread the light of wisdom" can be achieved only by the practice of giving more opportunities for higher education to the rural community. Thus, we take all steps to have more programmes and more facilities.

#### 3. The Context:

Being the only higher education institution in a vast rural area, we think it is our responsibility and the need of the public to have more programmes in our college. The challenging issues in this before particular context the public were lack ofopportunities for higher education. The economically backward community could not afford higher education places. Absence of adequate transport facility, a community deprived of opportunities for higher education and above all a vast area with a large number of feeding schools urged us to adopt the practice of starting more programmes and facilities in our college.

#### 4. The Practice:

The college had a very humble beginning with only two batches of pre-degree courses in Arts and Commerce streams and minimum infrastructural facilities in 1981. But in course of time, three Science batches were added. In 1991, the college was upgraded to a Degree college by beginning undergraduate programme in Mathematics. Later on, the following courses were added.

- a) B.Sc. Chemistry (1993)
- b) B.A. Economics (1995)
- c) B.Sc. Physics (1998)
- d) B.B.A. (1999)
- e) B.A. English (2001)

Due to Government policies, we could not add more programmes for a while. However, the changes in the government policy and political scenario helped us to stick on to our practice of adding more programmes. In 2013, our institution obtained a higher status by beginning a P.G. programme in Communication and Journalism. Along with this programme, Government sanctioned only one more U.G. programme in the aided stream as a policy matter. However, more U.G. and P.G. programmes in the self-financing stream could be sanctioned if the institution satisfies all criteria. Thus, we started M.Com and B.C.A. in the un-aided stream

in 2013. This year we have applied for M.A. English, M.S.W., M.Com. with Cooperation, B.Com. with Finance and B.A. English with Journalism as complementary course.

More programmes necessitated more facilities. With the beginning of the first undergraduate programme (B.Sc. Mathematics), the Degree Block was inaugurated in 1991. Then onwards, the college has a steady progress in developing its infrastructure.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

Our practice of starting more courses has been proved to be a successful one. The absence of adequate higher education opportunities in this rural area urged us to adopt this as the best practice. The college which started in 1981 remained a Junior college for almost a decade. The policy of the government was the reason stagnation. However, the continuous effort of the behind the management and other benefactors of the college to add more courses finally met with success when the University and the government sanctioned an undergraduate program in Mathematics in 1991. It marked a great stride towards progress in the history of the college. The people of the locality accepted the new course with much applause proving that our practice is a successful one. Since then, the department of Mathematics produced many rank holders. unparalleled An achievement, i.e., 1000/1000 marks twice, brought the college the limelight of the educational achievements. As the number of applicants and demand for more courses increased, we decided to stick on to the practice of Thus, starting more new courses. whenever the policy of the government was in favour, the institution started new courses. For that purpose, we kept the campus infrastructure-ready. The number of applicants and the achievements in the academic field prove that our practice is a successful one. New courses opened new ways of progress. The institution approached funding agencies like UGC to enhance its infrastructural facility. The management also contributes more than its share in our practice successful one.

## 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

In the first stages of the development of the institution, we met with problems like inadequate fund for developing infrastructure. The remoteness of the college was another problem which caused stagnation in the process of development. The policy of the government was always a hindrance for us. The reluctance of successive governments to sanction more new courses was the main problem we encountered. But

with the delinking of pre-degree courses from colleges, the then government was forced to sanction more degree courses in the aided colleges. Due to the absence of adequate transport facility, the institution failed to attract better students.

More fund is required for better infrastructure facilities. Sufficient number of posts of non-teaching staff is not sanctioned by the government. We require more office staff to do the additional workload accompanied along with the new programmes. The government should change the policy and sanction more courses in the aided stream.

#### **Best Practice 2**

## 1. Title of the Practice

## "Care to Nature; Service to Society"

The second best practice of the institution is the protection of nature and social service.

#### 2. Goal

To protect nature for the posterity is one of the prime goals of the institution. Conservation and rebuilding of nature aims at cultivating a sense of responsibility in the stakeholders. Clean and green campus is another goal of this practice. Protection of water sources and biodiversity is also a goal of this practice.

Serving the society must be a culture of the educated community. We aim at moulding a new generation committed to the society. By adopting service to the society as a practice, the institution aims at providing opportunities to the students for social services. Through social service we also aim at inculcating fellow feeling in students.

#### 3. The Context

The merciless exploitation of nature, around the institution was the immediate context that urged us to practice nature protection. The 'cry for nature' cannot go unheard. The student community must be properly oriented in this direction. The campus which was once a barren area had to be converted into a green field. Sustainable development

has to be the slogan of the period.

The college is situated in a rural area which requires a lot of social service, prompted us to cultivate the practice of service to the society. Social service has become a part of our curriculum.

#### 4. The Practice

The nature club of the institution has been organizing nature study camps at various wild life sanctuaries in the state for the last fifteen years. We conduct classes on nature issues inviting eminent environmentalists like Kallen Pokkuden and Dr. Khaleel Chovva. We undertake protection of a river near the college under the project called "River Protection Project". Hundred bamboo saplings were planted on the banks of 'Mukkannithodu' to protect it from landslides. The hard work of the former students made the campus green. All the trees in the campus are planted by the students and conserved by the following generation. We resort to unconventional energy sources like solar energy for our requirements. Our water harvesting project is a great step in this direction. All our constructions are with minimum hampering on nature. The campus is declared a plastic free zone.

From the very inception of the college, we have been committed to social service. The N.S.S and N.C.C regularly involve in social service activities. Every year N.S.S Units conduct seven day camps in rural areas. Construction of roads, playgrounds and various other activities are undertaken by the volunteers. N.C.C also involves in various activities like repairing roads, cleaning public places etc. Moreover, our students along with staff visit various old age homes, poor homes and orphanages at regular intervals. Apart from financial assistance, the students render services like washing clothes, and nursing old people and patients. Our students give lessons in computer soft skills in the nearby schools. Above all the entire academic community of the college actively participates in the dream project "Home for Homeless".

#### 5. Evidence of Success

The present campus is the best evidence of success of our best practice, 'care to nature.' Twenty years back the campus was a barren land without any trees. All the greenery in the campus is the results of the great work done by the former students and staff. The plastic free campus, the solar power system and rain water harvesting project are all indicators of the success of our practice. The protection of the 'mukkannithodu' is a great success.

Various social activities done by the NSS and NCC and other clubs of the college have been applauded by the society. The great success of the "Home for Homeless" project is an indicator of the success of our practice. The academic community of the college spent an amount of Rs.2.6 lakhs to construct a house for a tribal family at Thirunelly in Wayandu district. People from all walks of life appreciated this as one of the best practices of the institution. The government of Kerala appreciated and approved our "Home for Homeless" project as a great practice for educational institutions. In the inaugural ceremony of the home for tribal family, the ministers offered to nominate our institution as a nodal agency to build twenty houses for tribal families in Kannur and Wayanadu districts. An amount of fifty lakh rupees has been earmarked for this purpose.

The visit to old age homes created a positive impact on the minds of the students and the public. The enthusiasm of the students for such social work is yet another pointer to the success of our practice.

## 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

In the initial stage, greening the campus was a tough job. The laterite surface had to be covered with loads of soil and irrigated regularly. Shortage of time and fund for such work was a great problem. Attitude of the public in the beginning was not very conducive. In the semester system there is not enough time for social activities. More human resources are required for projects like river protection and home for homeless.
